





the picture disappeared. He took a closer look at the picture, he saw a strange creepy face of another person! The next day, it was back to normal again...


That picture is no longer hanging there. No one knows what really happened to that picture.


Tips to avoid encountering with supernatural things

A: I have been playing this musical instrument since 2005, so it's about eleven years. I picked up the saxophone when I was in Form 1.

Q: Why did you start playing the saxophone?

A: Actually I played the piano first when I was in Primary 3. However, when I was in Primary 5, I lost interest in playing it. When I was in secondary school, my school had a school band and I was interested in joining. I attended an audition and they accepted me. The teacher arranged for me to play the saxophone. I didn't know much about it at that time but I played it until today.

Q: What keeps you playing the saxophone?

A: First I love music very much. Also, I could meet new friends in the school band. As my music teacher told me, a musical instrument is not just a musical instrument, it is a tool to enable you to communicate with others, prove yourself and increase knowledge. For example, I can join some musical events in other countries to experience different things. It's a lot of fun and learning.

Q: Nowadays, there are so many jobs to choose. Why do you choose to be a music instructor?

A: My daily life is around music. I play music most of the time. Also, music was my major subject when I was in university. In Hong Kong, unless you are a member of a professional orchestra like the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra or the Hong Kong Sifonietta, you can't earn a living by performing music. On top of this, there is no saxophone in the orchestra and only very few pieces need a saxophone. So I give saxophone lessons to support myself. Of course, I want to share my skills and knowledge my teacher has taught me with other people.

Q: What can you gain from playing the saxophone?

A: Playing the musical instrument has trained up my patience as I can't give up easily in practicing. I also need to cooperate with people. I get happiness in the process too.

Q: Have you encountered any difficulties in learning the saxophone?

A: Learning the musical instrument isn't cheap. Fortunately, my school had many resources in music. I only needed to pay \$350 a month for one weekly lesson and three weekly band rehearsals. My school also lent me the instrument. Time was indeed another difficulty. When I was a student, I needed to study and play music. I couldn't say my music learning affected my studies. I think there were positive and negative effects. In the process, I learned how to solve problems. I even used the problem solving skills in my studies.

Q: Do you enjoy your job?

A: Yes I do. Teaching has given me great satisfaction. Besides teaching, I also take up freelance performances in different places and countries. For example, I perform in wedding ceremonies. I am happy that I can make the event more joyful. My music career is never boring. I'm not the type of person who wants to work in an office and do routine things.

Q: Which musician do you like most?

A: I like Nobuya Sugawa who is a Japanese saxophone performer. He is both a classical and pop saxophone performer. He is a genius and I love listening to his CDs.

Q: To compare with other schools, do you see any difference between LCD students and students of other schools?

A: Students here love talking with me and this may not happen in other schools. I enjoy teaching here.




